Moses, A friend of God

Deuteronomy 34

In this final chapter of Deuteronomy we again see Moses going up to the mountain alone to be with his friend, Yahweh. This being his last journey up the mountain and it seems here he is receiving final words from his creator and friend. We can but imagine the goodbyes Moses received from his people, the sadness that ran throughout Israel as they will not see Moses again, and the passing on the responsibility of leadership unto Joshua. The encouragement came to Joshua in the first chapter of the book of his name. But as Moses made it up to the plains to Mount Nebo we are told Yahweh showed him all the land that the Children of Israel will inherit.

(Deu 34:4) The LORD said, "Moses, this is the land I was talking about when I solemnly promised Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob that I would give land to their descendants. I have let you see it, but you will not cross the Jordan and go in."

Moses at that time was not to inherit that land however, we know from scripture that he will inherit that land forever in the Kingdom when Christ returns.

(Heb 11:23) By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden for three months by his parents, because they saw that the child was beautiful, and they were not afraid of the king's edict.

(Heb 11:24) By faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter,

(Heb 11:25) choosing rather to be mistreated with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin.

(Heb 11:26) He considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking to the reward.

(Heb 11:27) By faith he left Egypt, not being afraid of the anger of the king, for he endured as seeing him who is invisible.

(Heb 11:39) And all these, though commended through their faith, did not receive what was promised,

(Heb 11:40) since God had provided something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect.

Moses being on that list Paul wrote in exhortation to the Hebrews, of the faithful who will inherit the promise through the Kingdom.

The following verses tells us of the character of God in dealing with his friend. It is said that Moses died in the land, and he buried him in the Valley. Now let us ponder this thought carefully.

First question that comes to mind is, Who buried Moses? The obvious answer, God did. Now we are not told how God buried him just that he was buried. A possible scenario would be, as Some scholars believe Moses, went into a cave, laid down, then died and the cave was sealed shut.

It is said in verse 6 that no one knows exactly where Moses was buried, hence the reason why the 'he' in verse 6 must be talking about Yahweh himself. This is the first and only time we are told that Yahweh himself buried someone. This is how special Moses was in the eyes of our Father. His friend whom he conversed with earlier during the Exodus, **(Exo 33:11)** *Thus the LORD used to speak to Moses face to face, as a man speaks to his friend.*

When Moses turned again into the camp, his assistant Joshua the son of Nun, a young man, would not depart from the tent. Nowhere else in the Bible it is said that God speaks to a man as he speaks to his friend, not even of our Lord Jesus was this said. Another thing we learned from this chapter is that Moses was preserved while he lived. The natural aging process had not come upon him. At 120 years old, he eyes were still sharp they did not dim nor was his vigor or strength diminished. He was like a young man in body. Many of us older members would love to have this but only in Moses was this done.

So what are chapter? Several lessons are seen. We see another characteristic of our GOD and creator. The love he has for those who follow his word. Remember Moses was not perfect, Hence if he was he would have crossed the Jordan then with Israel. No, he sinned and he had the same nature as we, but what was his relationship with God?

They were friends! Was God sadden to have to bury his friend? What are your thoughts here? I think he was sadden. But couldn't he have kept Moses alive? To keep Moses alive in a sin cursed state, what good is that? He could but then we ask Why? Time as we know it in God's eyes is minute. A day to God is as a Thousand years, and a thousand years as one day. So God knew Moses will be raised and inherit the Kingdom in an immortal state shortly, so he allowed Moses to sleep and he will see him again in a short time. God drew high to Moses as he said he would to those who feared him and keep his commandments. So the question he have to ask ourselves is, Can we be a friend of God by our thoughts and actions? Do we have it in us to do this? Think on these things.

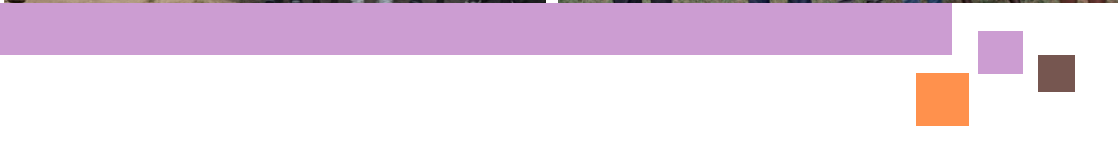

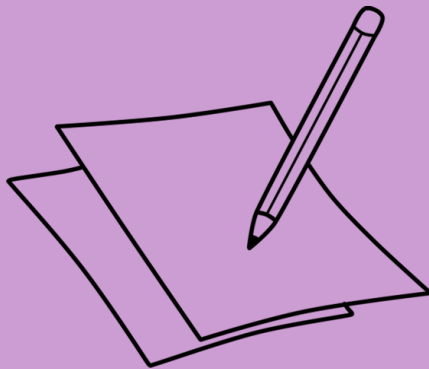

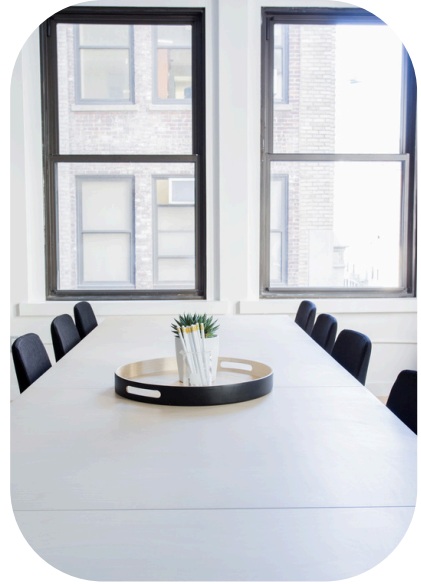

Introduction

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), also known as Global Goals, are a set of 17 integrated and interrelated goals to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure that humanity enjoys peace and prosperity by 2030.

Reporting on the SDGs is important in communicating to stakeholders the organization's commitment to contributing to the Global Goals; claiming accountability and responsibility to take the necessary actions; and measuring progress over time.

SDG Progress Reports cater to a variety of audiences, so it's best to adjust it accordingly. First, identify your target reader. Next, you can shift your focus on what they need to know. For example, your action plans are in the interest of your beneficiaries. Some readers might prefer details like timelines or budgets, while others like your trustees will be more interested in the impact made, the challenges you encountered and the lessons you learned from them.

Your SDG progress report can start with a brief review of your organization's alignment to the Global Goals. It can include the social responsibility and business case for taking action on the SDGs.

Creating a good SDG progress report means being transparent with your audience. Back up your claims with relevant data. Keep your sentences concise when necessary, but dive into detail when it comes to qualitative and quantitative evidence. Remember: this report is a combination of understanding how your mission aligns with global sustainability efforts, and communicating that clearly with the rest of the world.
